<p>This half day session will review:</p> <p>Emergency 911 dispatch system center Do all 911 calls go to the same place? Are there sufficient 911 dispatchers to handle multiple calls? Is there a dispatch policy re keeping 911 callers on the line? Do dispatchers know where all on duty and private duty officers are assigned and do they communicate? Are ambulances dispatched directly or through another agency?</p> <p>School Emergency Plans re Active Shooters Who notifies school staff of the emergency and how? Who are the second, or third person authorized to notify school staff if the primary is not capable or available? Is the public address system used? During an emergency can staff lock all doors from inside their rooms? If assigned is the School Security armed and wearing vests? Are all substitute teachers and staff issued the appropriate door keys to secure their area of responsibility? What is the policy for releasing students to families in a major event? What is the plan for closing a school for at least two weeks if not permanently?</p> <p>Law Enforcement Is law enforcement part of the School Security planning team? Do patrol officers know the school floor plan? Do the SWAT Teams know where the school is? Are there self dispatch restrictions for responders? Do all law enforcement agencies train the same for active shooter situations? Teams of 3 or 4 or something else? Is there a Family Liaison Officer Program in place to assist the investigators in working with the families and supporting the families by providing case information and other related services? Who will investigate a large mass murder event and who makes that decision? Who will do the major crime investigations while the mass murder case is being investigated? Expect minimum of one-year committing five detectives and a supervisor. What agency will investigate the guns purchases, sales and weapon exchanges? What agency will investigate the Internet and personal computer aspects of this investigation? Does your agency have a policy that prohibits restricts the taking of photographs of a crime scene? Who would handle a request to restrict helicopters from flying above a scene?</p> <p>Lessons Learned re Major Events What agency could handle 20 or more deceased in a murder case? Where would the bodies go? How and who will identify the bodies? No dental or fingerprints records are on file for most children. What grief counseling resources are available in large numbers for the victim's families? Who will handle the expected visits of local, county, state and national dignitaries? Mayor, Governor, President, etc. In all probability a small police department (less than 50) will not be capable of handling this case or even keep providing police services to the community. In this case who will provide police services? Fire, EMS will also need support. What group or agency will assist in the planning and coordination of multiple funerals?</p> <p>Media Relations Who will handle the media? Expect hundreds to respond. Where will the media be assembled? Twitter, Facebook, Web page, print releases? Who will handle fraud re donations and solicitations? Who will handle the release of information to the families prior to the release to the media? Who will take the lead role in providing information re gun law revisions to be proposed? To respond to media it will take a minimum of 3 public information staff for the first 10 days, 2 for the first month, and 1 full time for next 6 months. Are people trained to meet this requirement?</p> <p>Long Term Considerations</p>
