Exciting New Opportunities at Indiana State University! By Barbara A. Clauss, Ph.D.

Changes over the past several months have brought about exciting new opportunities for Family and Consumer Sciences at Indiana State University. As in many universities, ISU has undergone significant reorganization of programs, departments, and colleges in order to keep pace with students' evolving educational needs, demands on human and non-human resources, and the dynamic occupational landscape.

Reorganization has resulted in the disbanding of the Department of Family and Consumer Sciences and the movement of its programs out of the College of Arts and Sciences into two other colleges. The family and consumer sciences education, food and nutrition, and human development and family studies programs have moved to the College of Nursing, Health, and Human Services and have joined forces with the health sciences faculty to create the Department of Applied Health Sciences. This department, housed in the Health and Human Services building (a.k.a. the Arena Building) brings together students whose professional interests lie in the promotion of health and well-being of individuals, families, and communities through school, community, and medical programs, as well as consulting services and businesses.

In addition to enriching collegial relationships and expanding faculty members' teaching and research opportunities, the department and college offer greater resources for expansion than the FCS programs have been afforded in the past. Currently, committees in the department are interviewing candidates to fill four positions, three of which were created this year. In fact, the department boasts the highest number of potential new hires for the 2011-2012 academic year – no small feat in light of budget constraints! One of the new positions is in gerontology. The new faculty member will create courses that accommodate students needs in a variety of majors, such as nursing, dietetics, human development and family studies, and social work.

Students who are majoring in family and consumer sciences education (FACS Ed.) and majoring or minoring in human development and family studies (HDFS) continue to study the core concepts and theories promoted through AAFCS accreditation. With the other programs opting out of AAFCS accreditation, FACS Ed. and HDFS faculty are building a sequence of current and new courses to provide students with a strong foundation in knowledge and skills useful in school and community education and strengths-based programs.

The interior design program, now called interior architecture design, has moved to the College of Technology, into the Department of Built Environments. Philosophically and practically, it is a very good fit. The textiles, apparel and merchandising program has moved to the College of Technology, as well. It is now a part of the Department of Human Resource Development & Performance Technologies.

On a personal note, I am very pleased with the changes that have occurred and I am eager to participate in the growth of programs that address the practical and perennial challenges faced by individuals, families, and communities. Already, I have been able to teach new courses and I will assume responsibility for the school health (health education) program next academic year. This is an exciting prospect for me, as I will teach FACS Ed. and school health majors in teaching methods and professional development courses. Not only will I learn a new perspective on content, I will have a new pool of potential recruits to the FACS Ed. program! A new major, combining the two licensure areas will be developed soon! It is, indeed, an exciting time to be at ISU!

- COFO (Consortium of Family Organizations) – Diana Stone. The Family Impact Seminar for 2010 focused upon The Legacy of Literacy. The seminar is sponsored annually for state policymakers. Non-partisan information is provided on a current issue, policy or program whose consequences effect families. The desire to strengthen families helps to guide the selection of each year's topic. A successful Indiana program related to literacy is Head Start. Head Start is funded by federal tax dollars and “promotes school readiness of low-income children”.
- **Development** – Casey Dyson. The Silent Auction brought in \$958.00. \$410.00 was received for 41 Betty Lamp charms. - **IFHE** – Joan McFadden. Plans for the trip to Italy in July 2011 have been distributed and enough registrations were received to make the trip. “Especially 4-U Tours” is managing the tour. This eight-day trip starts on Friday, July 15th. The total cost of the trip is \$2,999 with the single room rate of \$3,599.

A TIS (Taking It to the Streets) Challenge was sent via the list serve in regards to the current childhood obesity prevention and last year’s H1N1 prevention efforts campaign. Contacts are being initiated for a possible presentation on BPA (Bisphenal A) for the 2011 conference. March is “Nutrition Awareness” month. Everyone is encouraged to use this as an opportunity to address the obesity prevention campaign.
- **Public Relations** – Leslie Gackle. During the shoe collection for Soles for Souls at the fall conference, 37 pairs were collected. The shoes will be added to the collection at Sullivan High School and transported to the collection facility in May. Our hope is to have 300 pairs of shoes to donate. Future plans include options of donations to Dress for Success in Indianapolis and/or a sharing station for classroom resources that teachers no longer are using but others may use.

- Breakout session: “Mathematical Quilts” Elaine Krajenke Ellison is a retired high school teacher of mathematics.
