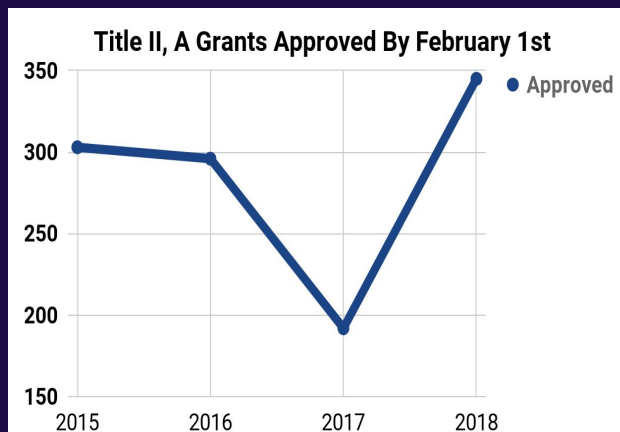

ESSA



The National Title I Association has three basic criteria to qualify as a Distinguished Title I School:

- ★ A poverty rate of at least 35%
- ★ Demonstrated high academic achievement for two or more consecutive years
- ★ Met or exceeded state-determined criteria based on two or more consecutive years of achievement data

Qualifying Categories:

- ★ Category 1: Exceptional student performance for two consecutive years
- ★ Category 2: Closing the achievement gap between student groups
- ★ Category 3: Excellence in serving special populations of students (e.g. homeless, migrant, English learners, etc.)

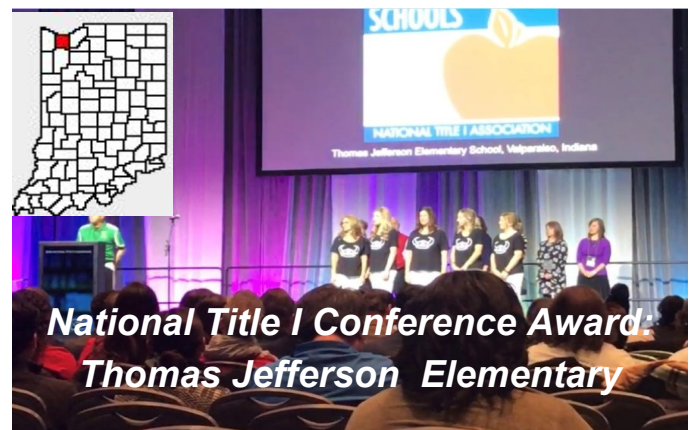
Demonstrated high performance for two consecutive years in
