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Subject: Cyberbullying Awareness

Background

October is National Bullying/Cyberbullying Prevention Month.

During the 2017-2018 school year, there were 5,604 confirmed bullying incidents in Indiana schools. Of those, 44 percent of the incidents were categorized as “written/electronic” incidents. This is more than a 600 percent increase in the number of written/electronic incidents as compared to the 2016-2017 school year (from bullying report). [Bullying data](#) is publicly available.

No later than October 15 of each year, every public school shall provide age appropriate, research based instruction as provided under IC 5-2-10.1-12(d)(1) focusing on bullying prevention for all students in grades 1 through 12.

Several K-8 computer science standards address cyberbullying and digital safety including:

- **K-2.IC.1** Practice responsible digital citizenship (legal and ethical behaviors) in the use of technology.
- **K-2.IC.2** Identify positive and negative social and ethical behaviors for using technology.

- **3-5.IC.1** Discuss basic issues related to responsible use of technology and information, and the consequences of inappropriate use.
- **3-5.IC.2** Identify the impact of technology (e.g., social networking, cyberbullying, mobile computing and communication, web technologies, cybersecurity, and virtualization) on personal life and society.
- **6-8.IC.1** Exhibit legal and ethical behaviors when using technology and information and discuss the consequences of misuse.
- **6-8.IC.2** Analyze the positive and negative impacts of technology on one's personal life, society, and our culture.
